Over the past year, the Community Arts & Heritage Education Project has grown again in the Thunder Bay community. We've built new partnerships, reached more children, youth and adults than ever before and have received recognition for our program development and implementation and our resource creation at the local, provincial and national level. We are proud to be able to work in collaboration with our many partners and we look forward to creating new partnerships over the next year.

Over the past 12 months, our local programs have reached 5589 children and youth with direct hands-on programming in arts and heritage. In addition, we've reached 155 adults and hired a total of 25 local artists, 43 local heritage programmers and 1 regional artist. We have partnered with: 27 different schools in Thunder Bay, 17 community organizations and 16 businesses. Learners involved in our various programs have received a total of 823 hours of hands-on arts and heritage education. We have shared our work with over 19,071 audience members and our community through our special projects, sharing days, launches, community arts projects, special events, in school performances and displays, the Arts Fiesta and the Spirit of the Anishnabae Celebration. We have reached 935 individuals through our presentations, conferences and seminars.

With our first site visits to our 13 partner communities for the Arts Education in Your Community Province Wide Roll Out initiative, CAHEP has reached:

- 160 new individuals through meetings and partnership development
- 484 children and youth with hands-on arts education workshops
- · 108 youth at risk with arts education workshops
- · 47 adults with hands-on arts education workshops
- 42 educators with hands-on arts education workshops

The impact we are making through working with excluded children and youth in arts and heritage is perhaps the most rewarding work of all. Our programs ensure everyone has the opportunity to participate in art making. We proudly believe that CAHEP is transforming lives through hands-on creative work in arts and heritage.

We are proud of every child, youth and adult who has created or been a part of the beautiful visual art, dance, music, heritage projects, stories and plays we have been a part of this past year. They have created from their hearts and we are honoured to have been a part of their inspiration!

Community Arts & Heritage Education Project

Community Arts & Heritage Education Project (CAHEP) is a multi-disciplinary arts education organization that has been in existence since March 2003.

Mandate:

CAHEP is a grass-roots community-based arts and heritage education organization created to develop and implement multi-disciplinary arts and heritage programming and resources for the benefit of the Thunder Bay community.

Vision:

Experiences in Arts and Heritage transform lives and communities.

Mission:

CAHEP believes that healthy, creative, enriched communities are built by citizens of all ages working collaboratively. By engaging in accessible visual art, language, drama, music and dance, people will discover the joy of arts and heritage within their own lives, and create a legacy by fostering a commitment to culture.

CAHEP creates programming that is student/child/youth centered in that they are the leaders in the creative process facilitated by the artists/arts educators in collaboration with the educators/community leaders.

History and Background:

In December of 2000, an Arts Education sub-committee of the City of Thunder Bay's Arts & Heritage committee completed a study on Best Practices in Arts Education from several cities in both Canada and the USA. The study also looked at what programming was already in place locally, who could access that programming and where the gaps in programming existed. From the results of the study, several recommendations were made to improve the level of arts education for our community.

These recommendations were:

- 1. More financial support for artists
- 2. More community-based arts education programming
- 3. Partnerships with private sector and individual artists
- Artists in Residency programs
- 5. More venues for young artists to perform and display their talents

CAHEP began as a pilot project funded through the Ontario Trillium Foundation (OTF). A Steering Committee acted as the Board through the first two years of OTF funding. CAHEP also set up a Network Group with 18 stakeholders in arts and heritage that included individual artists, arts and heritage organizations and educators. The CAHEP Network Group offered suggestions and had collaborative input to help develop CAHEP's programming and resources.

Partway through its second year, CAHEP established a small working group from the original Steering Committee which refined our mandate/vision and created our constitution and by-laws. The original Steering Committee was dissolved after the OTF funding was finished. The first CAHEP Board consisted of the 5 individuals who participated in the work that was done to create the by-laws and constitution of the organization. In February 2005, CAHEP was incorporated as a not-for-profit organization and in June 2005, we received our Charitable Status.

Programs, Resources and Services

CAHEP creates programming that is student/child/youth centered in that they are the leaders in the creative process facilitated by the artists/arts educators in collaboration with the educators/community leaders. We believe in working collaboratively with our partners. CAHEP believes that healthy communities are built by the citizens of the community working, sharing and learning together. We believe that when communities are engaged in arts and heritage experiences, they will create their own art, stories, plays, music and dance discovered from within, and connected to the place they are from. Through connecting arts and heritage to our collective past, present and future, and by encouraging communities to express who they are through arts and heritage, CAHEP believes connections are made that will grow and be passed onto the next generation. This fosters an ongoing commitment to arts and heritage, a desire to work together as a community, and a collective vision to transform lives and communities.

CAHEP's arts education programs are multi-disciplinary. We offer:

General Arts Programming - With GAP, either CAHEP or Artist & Heritage Programmers are approached by a school or community group seeking arts programming.

Artists in the 5th - CAHEP sends professional Artist and Heritage Programmers into grade 4/5, 5 and 5/6 classrooms. Each year, a theme is chosen as the jumping off point for the learners, artists and educators to collaborate on for an arts or heritage project. The theme for 2008-2009 was "Into the Future". Some projects are multi-disciplinary — with various numbers of artists working collaboratively on a project with the educator and the learners. CAHEP, along with our funding partners, subsidizes the programming, thereby making it accessible for all schools. Last year, 560 learners from 22 classes from 17 schools participated on 19 projects. 13 local artists were hired to work collaboratively with 22 educators to deliver 212 hours of multi-disciplinary arts education programming. A total of 8 visual art projects were completed with over 350 pieces of art work. 11 performance pieces were created of which 4 were multi-disciplinary, 2 were in French, and 2 were multi-media film projects.

Arts Fiesta - All the dance, play creation, spoken word, written word, music, visual art and new media art created from Artists in the 5th is seen on stage at the Arts Fiesta. The visual art is on display at the Fiesta as well as out in the community at various locations for 3 weeks. The learners see each other's work in the arts, stemming from the same theme, and they review each other's work in the arts, thus honing their critical thinking skills. Last year the Arts Fiesta was held at the Thunder Bay Community Auditorium. 1100 people attended the Arts Fiesta.

The visual art went on display out in the community at:

- Thunder Bay Art Gallery, Underlay Gallery,
- Paterson Library Confederation College, Waverley Library
- Magnus Theatre lobby hallways
- · Thunder Bay Airport and three RBC Bank Lobby locations

Over 5000 people saw the learners' work. Each participating school also set up a visual art display at their school or performed their play creation/movement piece for their entire school. This enabled CAHEP to reach a further 5000 learners as audience members.

RBC After School Program - CAHEP applied for and was successful in receiving our third RBC After School Program Grant and we ran the program with 60 learners for the 2008-2009 school year at Ogden and St Jude schools for the first half of the year and Ecole Gron Morgan and Corpus Christi schools for the second half of the year. CAHEP's After School program was chosen as one of the very best in Canada in 2006, and we were the "poster organization" for the program. We were seen in every RBC Bank across the country.

This year the 2 groups of learners each received:

- 8 completely different projects in arts and heritage (125 hours of hands-on work with professional artist and heritage programmers)
- 8 Sharing Days that bring their extended families and the community in to see what they have been working on
- a healthy snack
- music appreciation
- academic help with homework
- 4 health and wellness presentations

Arts and Heritage for All - Excluded Children and Youth Program in arts and heritage - CAHEP completed our two year full time program in December 2008.

This program included:

- · Six partners in year one and six new partners in year two
- 750 excluded children and youth reached with hands-on programming throughout the two year program
- Mentorship program for emerging arts educators
- 663 hands-on arts education hours delivered for excluded children and youth
- Sharing Days where their work in arts and heritage is seen by their extended families, youth workers and their peers

Year One Partners: W.W. Creighton Youth Services – J.J. Kelso Centre and The Attendance Centre, Thunder Bay Boys & Girls Club, Dilico-Child and Family Services, Sister Margaret Smith Centre, and Shkoday Abinojiiwak Obimiwedoon: Urban Aboriginal Strategy.

Year Two Partners: W.W. Creighton Youth Services – Bruce J. McKitrick Centre and Jack McGuire Centre, Thunder Bay Big Brothers Big Sisters, Our Kids Count, Shkoday Abinojiiwak Obimiwedoon: Aboriginal Head Start Program, Schoolhouse Playcare Centre.

The program was free for the participants. Each organization, in collaboration with the children and youth they serve, chose 66 hours of arts and heritage programming form CAHEP's offer roster. Throughout the program, CAHEP hosted Sharing Days where each participating organization shared their project with their families, youth workers and friends. 134 children and youth have received 163 arts and heritage programming hours from July 2008 to December 2008.

Arts Education in Your Community initiative - Province Wide Roll Out

CAHEP is currently working in collaboration with 13 communities in 12 locationsin Northwestern and Northeastern Ontario for our "Arts Education in Your.
Community" initiative. CAHEP is collaborating with these communities in a
consultation/facilitation role to enhance self-identified arts education projects,
training, workshops, resources and events in their communities. Each community
has chosen the training, projects, workshops, arts education work that they want
to move forward with. CAHEP is facilitating collaborative partnership
development within each of the partner communities.

Aboriginal Arts Program - This new program was developed and implemented during January and February 2009, in collaboration with the Thunder Bay Catholic District School Board, Thunder Bay Aboriginal Arts & Heritage Group, 6 local First Nations artists and heritage programmers and an Elder. CAHEP reached 4000 learners in grades 1 through 6 with hands-on projects and presentations connected to the Aboriginal Culture — both traditional and contemporary. The program culminated with a large celebration — Spirit of the Anishnabae — where 1530 learners and 400 parents participated in the event, learned about the culture, various dances and participated in dancing at the event. Due to the success of this program, CAHEP will be offering this program again in January and February 2010 with the Spirit of the Anishnabae Celebration scheduled for March 12, 2010.

Workshops, Seminars, Professional Development - CAHEP offers on-going workshops and seminars to community groups, schools and businesses in all arts disciplines and in arts education skills. We offer on-going training and mentorship programs for emerging artists, heritage programmers and arts educators in our community. CAHEP also provides internships in arts education for graduating students through Lakehead University's visual art and concurrent education program.

During 2008-2009 CAHEP facilitated the following workshops:

- Eleanor Drury Children's Theatre 8 hands-on workshops in all the arts disciplines
- Sounds of Superior Chorus script consultation and creative consultation
- Saints Choir 2 vocal voice workshops— Aboriginal Youth Choir
- City of Thunder Bay Girl Power drama workshop
- Marathon Educator's Workshop professional development in drama/movement/arts education
- Arts Education in Your Community initiative 39 hands-on workshops offered to children, youth, educators and adults across the region in arts education, professional development and training and mentoring.

Artists Residencies and Community Arts Projects – CAHEP engages in Artist Residency Projects whenever time and resources permit. Over the past year, we have not had an Artist Residency Project.

Community Arts Projects – CAHEP participated in one community arts project over the past year. Uth Ink engaged 11 youth between the ages of 12 and 18. This national partnership in collaboration with Playwrights Guild of Canada and five Ontario communities offered workshops with local playwright, Eleanor Albanese. The youth wrote short scenes and pieces connected to specific areas in Thunder Bay. They recorded their work at Confederation College. Signs were installed at the locations connected to the scenes the youth wrote. Anyone can listen to the scenes by keying in a number to hear the stories connected to our community. Their work was published by Playwrights Guild of Canada in an anthology called: Uth Ink – Word From the Street.

Lakehead University Research Project - CAHEP was one of the collaborative partners involved in a research project with Dr. Lisa Korteweg from Lakehead University. CAHEP was contracted to develop and deliver 16 sessions of a Photo Voice Project with 35 grade 7 learners at Bishop Gallagher School. The learners worked over a 3 month period to take digital photographs both at school and at home. They learned how to change, enhance or manipulate the photographs to bring deeper meaning to them in connection to the chosen theme for the work. 25 slide shows with text were completed from this project that looked at Transition and Change in the lives of the learners. The project was very successful and if funding is found, CAHEP may be asked to participate in the future.

Community Involvement

Program Development – CAHEP acts as a linking resource. We are often asked to offer assistance to either educators or community groups when they are working out a program or trying to book artists or heritage programmers in their classrooms or centers. This has more artists and heritage programmers working, more children and youth receiving arts-based programming and more organizations and schools benefiting from and understanding the strengths of arts education programming.

Community Partners - CAHEP partners with various community organizations, businesses and agencies locally and provincially. Our partners over the past 12 months include: Aboriginal Arts and Heritage Group of Thunder Bay, Lakehead Public Schools, Thunder Bay Catholic District School Board, Conseil scolaire de district catholiques des Aurores boreales, Lakehead University, Confederation College, Thunder Bay District Health Unit, City of Thunder Bay, Thunder Bay Boys & Girls Club, Shkoday Abinojiiwak Obimiwedoon - Aboriginal Head Start, Schoolhouse Playcare Centre, Our Kids Count, Big Brother Big Sister, Creighton Youth Services - McGuire and McKitrick Centres, Eleanor Drury Children's Theatre, Sounds of Superior Chorus, Saints Choir, United Way of Thunder Bay, Underlay Gallery, Brodie Library, Chapters, Canadian Tire - Thunder Centre, Dennis Cromarty High School, North of Superior Film Association, Thunder Bay Art Gallery, RBC Royal Bank, Kam Valley Fiddlers, Thunder Bay Community Auditorium, Playwrights Guild of Canada - Uth Ink Project, Thunder Bay Airport, Bearskin Airlines, Definitely Superior Artist Run Centre and over 67 individual artist and heritage programmers.

CAHEP Province-Wide Roll Out — CAHEP has been funded by the Ontario Trillium Foundation and the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund Corporation for a Province-Wide Roll out of our Best Practices Models in Arts Education. Our partner communities include: Atikokan, Dryden, Fort Frances, Sioux Lookout, Kenora, Red Lake, Nipigon, Red Rock, Marathon, Sault Ste. Marie, Manitoulin Island, Sudbury and North Bay. We began our first hands-on site visits to the communities in the spring of 2009. Through the Province-Wide Roll Out, CAHEP is sharing our methods, models, resources and strategies in arts education, program development skills, special projects in arts and heritage, training and mentoring of local artist and heritage programmers within each community and any other projects the participating community may want to explore in arts education. This two year initiative has us visiting and working with each community until December 2010.





CAHEP Events

CAHEP Special events – Our small CHAPTERS NIGHT fundraiser was well attended and 5 Board members contributed 20 hours in total for this event. CAHEP also received the benefit screening fundraiser from North of Superior Film Association where the film "Man on a Wire" was shown. Attendance was very good at this fundraiser.

CAHEP also participated in the City of Thunder Bay's Summer in the Parks and the Teddy Bears Picnic where we worked with over 650 children to create insect masks, teddy bear masks and flower fairies. We also participated in the Thunder Bay Boys and Girls Club Picnic where over 250 children and youth created flower fairy creatures.


