We worked in collaboration with our non-arts partner organizations to ensure they become advocates and supporters of the incredible impact arts programming can have on individuals and their communities. We are proud to play an active role in ensuring the arts are infiltrated into building, strengthening, and growing a creative, understanding, more accepting community.

CAHEP is continually fuelled, inspired, and humbled by the creativity that is brought to us by local artists, partners, and participants in our programming. We are grateful for the connections we've made, and are excited to continue to bring arts to more schools and the community of Thunder Bay.

WHO IS CAHEP?

CAHEP is an award-winning non-profit charitable arts education organization based in Thunder Bay. Together with local artists, schools, and organizations who serve the community, we develop and implement inclusive, multidisciplinary arts and heritage programming.

To ensure participants take pride and ownership of what they create, we encourage them to lead their artistic process every step of the way; from the type of project they engage in, to creation, to how the work is showcased to the community. They are encouraged to use the arts to share their stories, hopes, and dreams, to build a stronger community for all.

History:

In December of 2000, an Arts Education sub-committee of the City of Thunder Bay's Arts & Heritage Committee completed a study on Best Practices in Arts Education from several cities in both Canada and the USA. The study looked at what programming was already in place locally, who could access that programming, and where the gaps existed. From the results of the study, several recommendations were made to improve the level of arts education for our community.

These recommendations included:

- · More financial support for artists
- More community-based arts education programming
- Partnerships with private sector and individual artists
- Artists in Residency programs
- More venues for young artists to perform and display their talents.

2013-2014 PROGRAMS

CAHEP develops programming that spans across the arts disciplines and that is driven by the creative ideas of participating children, youth, families, and seniors.


We believe in working collaboratively with partners to bring inclusive arts programming that addresses barriers people face in their day to day lives. Healthy communities are built when citizens work, share, learn, and create together.

We offer: General Arts Programming, Artists in the 5th - Arts Fiesta, What About the Books/Forest of Reading, Neighbourhood Arts Engagement Programming, Connecting with Community, Art to the Streets Programming, Rural Arts Programs, Resources, and Opportunities for Mentorship and Development.

We encourage intergenerational, cross-cultural, and youth engagement in our programming.

Artists in the 5th - Arts Fiesta

Since 2003, this core CAHEP program has infused the arts into local elementary schools across the City together with local artists and heritage programmers. Focusing on an enriching collaborative process, educators, students in grades 4, 5, and 6, and artists work together to create projects in dance, drama, literary arts, music, new media, and visual arts.



Participating artists encourage students to provide input into every step of the creative process; from the beginnings, when project ideas are just seeds, to how work is presented at the Arts Fiesta. This instils a strong sense of pride and leadership in each and every artwork that is created.

To showcase all of the work created through Artists in the 5th, CAHEP hosts the Arts Fiesta, a celebration for participating artists. classes, educators, and the community. In 2014, the Arts Fiesta was held in partnership with the Thunder Bay Multicultural Association's Folklore Festival at Fort William Gardens, 7 performance projects were showcased on stage, and 9 visual art and media projects were displayed in a pop-up art gallery, both at the Arts Fiesta and throughout the







weekend of Folklore Festival. Classes were given the opportunity to participate in an afternoon of cultural workshops, provided by the Thunder Bay Multicultural Association. They also receive the opportunity to evaluate the day and their experience in the program.

Forest of Reading/What About the Books


Since 2011 this program has run in conjunction with the Ontario Library Association and the Forest of Reading Program. Through the Forest of Reading program, CAHEP engaged artists in school classes to create projects related to books nominated for the prestigious Blue Spruce Awards. Projects were displayed at the Festival of Trees, an event at the Coliseum Grounds that is hosted by the Ontario Library Association for more than 1200 students.

During the Festival of Trees, CAHEP hosts a series of bookinspired visual art activities for students in attendance.

14 school classes from the Thunder Bay Catholic District School Board participated in visual art projects with 6 local artists: Derek Khani, Sarah Eby, Judy Mayor, Nicole Armstrong, Pam Cain and Carol Kajorinne.

Neighbourhood Arts Engagement Program

This program has been developed to **build relationships using the arts in underserved neighbourhoods across Thunder Bay.** CAHEP works in partnership with community and social service organizations who serve these neighbourhoods, have a strong connection to children and youth, and have a space within the neighbourhood to offer programming.

The Neighbourhood Arts Engagement Program is in place to familiarize participants with the arts, connect them with neighbours through short-term creative programming, share stories, and develop a stronger sense of identity within their neighbourhoods. It addresses barriers faced by participants by providing inclusive, free of cost arts programming offered by project coordinators and for special projects, local artists.

Neighbourhoods served in 2013-2014 include:

- Simpson Ogden through Evergreen a United Neighbourhood
- Blucher/Picton/Windsor through Community Action Group and the Boys & Girls Club
- Victoria Avenue/Downtown Fort William through Youth Centres
 Thunder Bay and the Fort William BIA
- Vale/Limbrick through the Vale Boys & Girls Club

Special Project:

The Bucket List: Through a partnership with Youth TBay and Hospice Northwest, local artist, Eleanor Albanese worked with 15 youth to create mixed media artworks surrounding the idea of living life to the fullest. These works were created as a part of Hospice Northwest's Die-Alogues event that was developed to reduce the stigma surrounding death and dying. The artwork that was created was put on display during this event at the Baggage Building Arts Centre.

Participants connected with their inspiring personal histories, stories, and hopes and dreams for the future using collage techniques, written word/poetry, and paint.

Art to the Streets

This program was piloted in September 2013 in partnership with Evergreen a United Neighbourhood. Children and youth in the Simpson Ogden neighbourhood had engaged in our Neighbourhood Arts Programming and identified that they felt there would be great benefit in bringing more intensive arts programming into the neighbourhood. They strongly connected to cultural programming, visual arts, and media arts program. Through this, Art to the Streets was born.



20 local artists infiltrated the neighbourhood, bringing over 110 hours of inspiring creative programming to over 850 children, youth, and their families. Projects were hosted at Minnesota Park and at Evergreen's new Community House on Heron Street.

As the program progressed, youth gained confidence in the arts and took great ownership of the program. They became volunteers within their neighbourhood, taking the lead in setting up for workshops and informing the kinds of projects they took part in. Youth who had never had access to art supplies became lead photographers at community events and programs. They built positive relationships with their peers, and neighbours from other generations through collaborative creation. They began to set positive goals for themselves and their community.

When the program wrapped up, neighbours of all ages in the area took the initiative to independently create their own mural on a fence in the yard of the Evergreen House.

Special Project Highlight:

Thunder Bay Food Strategy Partnership

In collaboration with the Thunder Bay Food Strategy, CAHEP worked with local artists to integrate the arts into topics surrounding food. This project was developed to increase awareness of the importance of food and the work done by the Food Strategy.

Projects included:

Pizza Garden Stickers: With local artist Sarah Eby, a grade 4/5 class at Ogden Community School created Pizza Garden boxes and stickers. Stickers were given to local business, Eat Local Pizza, and distributed on pizza boxes throughout the City.

Community Garden Signage: Local artist Carol Kajorinne worked with a Grade 5 class at rural Gorham & Ware School to design and paint signs for their new community garden.

Rain Barrel Project: Carol Kajorinne and Derek Khani facilitated a rain barrel painting project together with the Thunder Bay Country Market.

Flower Bombs: Local artist and eco-activist, Sarah Eby worked together with attendees at Docs on Bay, hosted by Bay Street Film Festival to create artful flower bombs that would spread greenery to empty spaces in town.



Rural Arts Program

The Rural Arts Program is a community art initiative designed to bring the arts to children and youth who live in under-serviced rural areas surrounding Thunder Bay.

Its goal is to increase rural access to the arts by providing free-ofcost programs that are within rural spaces (libraries, community halls, schools, and other alternative locations).

Whenever possible, artists who live within rural areas are hired to deliver programming.



I am Where I Live: Art Camps at Gillies Community Centre and Blake Hall Participants engaged in a variety of activities that enabled them to use the arts to share stories connected to their rural homes.

Commemorative Art Ceiling Tiles: Kakabeka Legion and Kakabeka School

Artist Judy Mayor worked with Grade 7 students at Kakabeka School to design posters and artwork that was transferred using paint to ceiling tiles for display at the Kakabeka Legion. This project was an intergenerational initiative and connected youth with seniors and veterans who live in rural areas.

Pottery Workshop: Rural artist Fritz Lehmberg facilitated a 3-day introduction to ceramic and pottery arts in the South Gillies Township.

Artists in the 5th: Gorham & Ware and Nor'Wester View Schools participated performance and visual art projects through Artists in the 5th

Painted Garden Signs: Learners at Gorham and Ware School in Lappe
Township painted signs for their newly developed community garden with rural artist Carol Kajorinne and as part of a partnership with the Thunder Bay Food Strategy.

Festival Showcase of Arts & Heritage Education

This ten day festival was coordinated by CAHEP in February of 2014 as an opportunity for the community to participate, create and enjoy the arts throughout the City.



Local groups and arts organizations were encouraged to develop and offer their own participatory arts programming that the community could engage in. CAHEP developed and implemented our own programming in partnership with a number of local organizations, and acted as a resource that groups could draw upon when developing their own projects.

Professional Development and Resources

CAHEP believes in creating a strong future for the arts by providing opportunities for artists and community groups to connect, learn We do this through:

- · Mentoring new generation and emerging arts educators
- Providing internships for Fine Arts and Education Students from Lakehead University
- Offering professional development opportunities for artists
- Providing professional development in the arts for non-arts partners
- Our online Arts & Heritage Education Directory



We work in partnership with Lakehead University's Fine Arts Program to offer a 48 hour Arts Education Internship for Major Studio students as a part of their Internship Course Credit. Interns receive the opportunity to learn about how a small non-profit runs, participate in mentorships provided by local artists, learn hands-on skills by providing on-site support at CAHEP programs, and assist with event and project development.

To ensure the arts education/community arts sector of Thunder Bay is sustained and infiltrated with vibrant new energy, we offer mentorship opportunities for artists who are interested in working with CAHEP, but who lack experience. New artists receive the opportunity to work with CAHEP staff and artists to learn about project development, implementation, and successfully engaging learners. Some mentorships are collaborative, meaning the new artists receive the opportunity to integrate their own skills into a project with a more experienced artist.







2013-2014 Mentorships were provided for: Eric Miller (circus arts), Dayna Slingerland (textile/craft), Sarah Eby (mixed media), Laura Wilson (dance), Victoria Bolduc (Summer Experience Student/Visual Artist) & Zach Bryson (media arts).

Learn & Grow Professional Development for Community Organizations

In June 2014, we began to offer opportunities for organizations who serve the community to get together, learn, and create. This ensures that these organizations are able to integrate the arts into their own core programs. It places value on using art to connect clients who access their programs, building a stronger community.

In our first workshop, CAHEP provided participants with the opportunity to learn about ways to create art with children and youth using accessible, low-cost materials.

CAHEP staff and board worked together with consultant, Margaret Wanlin to develop our 2014-2017 Strategic Plan. Directions include:

- Accessible Programming: To offer arts and heritage education programs through inclusive engagement, regardless of economic, social, and cultural background
- Partnerships: To deliver programming through mutually beneficial collaborations.
- School Programs: To offer schools resources to engage children and youth in arts and heritage, and develop new ways to engage students in arts and heritage.
- Staffing: To develop a staff of artists who can administer the organization. To engage and support a diverse roster of arts and heritage educators
- Sustainability: To achieve a sustainable level of funding and human resources to achieve goals. To recruit and orient Board members who have clear roles and value their engagement with the organization.
















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
