WHO IS CAHEP?

CAHEP is an award-winning artist-led organization unique to Thunder Bay. We bring free-of-cost arts education programming to children, youth, their families, and seniors within our community, and within schools.

Each year, we work with 50 paid local artists and more than 11,000 participants in Thunder Bay. The artists we work with represent a diverse skillset, including dance, drama, cultural programming, literary arts, music, new media, and visual arts.





ART MAKES CHANGE



We believe that arts can transform lives.

Our programs are designed to **empower participants** and address barriers they may face. We take time to get to know them as individuals, learn about their needs and interests, and together, create an arts program that responds to exactly what they would like to do.

Using the arts, we're able to ensure that individuals, regardless of barriers that may exist, are engaged, can develop leadership skills, take healthy risks, collaborate, and foster a strong sense of pride in themselves, their peers, and their communities.

OUR STORY

CAHEP began in 2003 as a pilot project funded through the Ontario Trillium Foundation, put in place to address community needs established by a network group of 18 stakeholders.

These needs included:

- · More financial support for artists
- · More community-based arts education programs
- · Partnerships with private sector and individual artists
- Artist in Residency programs
- More venues for young artists to perform and display their talents

From here, CAHEP sprouted into a dynamic and award-winning multidisciplinary arts education organization. We began offering programs in collaboration with the schools and community of Thunder Bay, engaging thousands of children, youth, families, and seniors each year. Our artists have facilitated a multitude of projects that range from short-term workshops in cultural programming, dance, drama, literary arts, music, media, and visual art, to longer-term multi-artist collaborations including Uth Ink (youth playwriting project), and an in-depth theatre project titled How Bear Heart Woman Brought Truth Back to the People.

Throughout our 13 years of operation, our organization and its programs have kept flexible, developing programs that respond to the ever-changing needs of our community.

2015 was an incredible year for collaborations. We received more than double the number of requests for our Artists in the 5th program (from 11 in 2013 to 30 in 2015).


It also marked new collaborations with arts partners from outside of Northern Ontario, expanding our creative community and growing our knowledge-base.





MAKING SPARKS!

ARTISTS IN THE 5TH 2015

Artists in the 5th is CAHEP's longest-running program.

This year brought plenty of excitement with the annual theme:

Making Sparks. 14 local artists worked with 21 grades 4,5 and
6 classes (over 500 students!) to create dance, drama, new media,
street art, and visual art projects that explored themes of light,
sparking change, individuality, and unity.

All projects were presented at the Arts Fiesta, hosted this year at the Thunder Bay Community Auditorium. Over 700 were in attendance to enjoy this multidisciplinary arts extravaganza.

Thanks to the Folklore Festival, we also had the opportunity to host 11 visual art projects at their weekend-long community event, reaching an additional audience of 10,000.



GENERAL ARTS PROGRAM

CAHEP saw a large growth in school program requests in 2014-2015. To make sure that we could bring arts to more classrooms, we offered General Arts Programming, engaging additional classes and community groups throughout the City.

We were able to bring arts programming to 6 additional classes through this initiative.

300 PARTICIPANTS ENGAGED IN THE PROGRAM



Funded through the District of Social Services Administration Board, this program ensures that under-served rural areas surrounding Thunder Bay have access to the arts. It has been designed to reduce transportation barriers that limit access to the arts for rural participants.

Rural areas include Kakabeka, Conmee, Neebing, Oliver Paipoonge, and Murillo.

In collaboration with local artists, arts programs unfold in community centres, libraries, and rural schools.

Participating children and youth engaged in projects that included theatre, music, visual art, and sculptural storytelling.

RURAL ARTS



ART TO THE STREETS

Sprouted from the Neighbourhood Arts Program, Art to the Streets brings professional artists to under-served neighbourhoods of Thunder Bay, including Simpson-Ogden, Limbrick/Vale, and Windsor Picton Blucher. All programs are free-of-cost and close to areas where participants live and play, reducing barriers that exist for many in our City. Partner organizations included Evergreen a United Neighbourhood, Community Action Group, Vale Community Centre, and Speak Up with Lakehead Unviersity.

Children, youth, families, and seniors have worked on projects that have included:

Street Sounds 2: Media arts dance party and hip hop show

We work with participants to decide on the types of projects they would like to engage in. We see youth grow to become neighbourhood leaders, families share stories that bring them closer, and the community build a support network through collaborative creation.

2014-15 was an exciting year for Art to the Streets. We received the Grand Prize from Tbaytel for Good, a voter-based funding program. We also received support from Ontario Arts Council's Artists in the Community/Workplace, and United Way's Youth 4 Community Program which brought a media arts component to the program.

NEIGHBOURHOOD ARTS PROGRAM

This program plants the seed to celebrate creativity within under-served neighbourhoods. With a focus on long-term presence, consistency of arts coordinators, and short arts activities, Neighbourhood Arts builds community, creates familiarity with arts, and builds capacity for larger-scale projects through Art to the Streets.

ART OF COMMUNITY

WORKSHOP FOR ARTISTS, DREAMERS, AND COMMUNITY ORGANIZERS







As community-engaged artists and arts educators, we sometimes spend so much time sharing our skills with others, that we forget how important it is to nurture our own creative practices. With this in mind, CAHEP approached Jumblies Theatre (Toronto), a leader in community arts, to develop a workshop designed just for artists.

In January 2015, Ruth Howard, the Artistic Director of Jumblies joined 25 local artists in Thunder Bay to offer a one-day introduction to community-building using arts.

Artists, administrators, and community organizers came together to make artwork, discuss what community means to us, and strengthen our creative skills and networks. We built miniature communities, wrote our hearts out, and sang and danced until we dropped.

Participants left feeling refreshed, inspired, and energized.

This partnership with Jumblies is the spark of something new and exciting in Thunder Bay! The voices of participants said...

In May 2015, CAHEP was delighted to be invited to participate in Jumblies Theatre's Train of Thought project.

This initiative engaged artists from across the country in a counter-colonial community arts journey from the West Coast to the East Coast. Train of Thought embarked on 41 days of travel to 24 communities with over 60 travellers, and over 90 partners. Throughout the journey we learned untold stories of communities, took part in community arts activities, and connected to the land we live on.

When they reached Thunder Bay we celebrated with a community feast with Elder Ma-Nee Chacaby, followed the next day by a celebration of art with over 60 participants at the Baggage Building Arts Centre. This event involved a storytelling tea party with Eleanor Albanese, blanket fort making, music-making with Lise Vaugeois, and several arts activities with Jumblies artists and travellers.

Our staff took turns jumping on board for the trip, taking part in projects from Vancouver to Winnipeg, Thunder Bay to Toronto, and Ottawa. We took part in full moon and eagle feather ceremonies in Mississagi FN with Thinking Rock Community Arts, put on a play in just two days with Aanmitaagzi Theatre (Nipissing FN), shared stories around a community fire with Debajehmujig Theatre in Manitoulin, honoured the water with song and ceremony, celebrated the traditional name of the waters around Sudbury, and feasted with Myths and Mirrors, all while connecting with dozens of incredible and inspiring artists.







TANGLED ON TOUR

CAHEP worked together with Tangled Art + Disability (Toronto) to help bring their first ever disability + arts festival to Thunder Bay.

We worked together to bring an art exhibit with Jana Brown to the Thunder Bay Art Gallery, facilitate a disability art film festival at the Finlandia Hall, and engage in a freeing movement project together with Peggy Baker Dance Studios at the Thunder Bay 55 Plus Centre.

This is the beginning of a valuable 3 year partnership. Together with Tangled, we are working to build capacity in Thunder Bay's own disability and arts sector, and strengthen our knowledge base surrounding disabled artists, artists with disabilities, and the disability arts community.
